As I looked back at the goals I've written for the SWIS District, I was pleased to see we are working toward meeting those goals quite well! Our 1st quarter conference was fun and

friendly, and focused on club members having time to share their ideas to improve membership and to participate in the oratorical contest. We also met and heard from our Vice President of the Great Plains region, Lyle Merriam. Good food, special awards and meeting the "turning over a new leaf" challenge (way too much fun on that one) rounded out the day!

A challenge was issued to the clubs to develop a NEW youth service project for the 2019-2020 year. This project must be new for the club, planned and implemented before October 1st, 2020, and must be a youth service project. Fundraisers will not be accepted. To apply, send me a brief summary of the project, your name and your club by July 31st, 2020. The winner will be announced and will receive their check at the SWIS District 4th Quarter Conference in August. The top winner will receive \$500; or if there is a tie, each club will be awarded \$250. Judges for the contest have not yet been determined, but will be done so in order to ensure that this contest is without bias. All projects will be shared after the contest so that other clubs can implement the projects in their communities as well.

The most important thing that needs to be worked on is increasing the membership, which lies solely in the hands of the clubs. Past Governor Maureen left the district with 51 more members than she started with, which is phenomenal! But the months that followed brought a quick decline of 25 members, and as of today, we are -43 members. I'm urging all clubs to try to be an honor club, meaning they will add 2 members to their roster (net) as quickly as they can! Ready, set, go! Another way to bring in more members is to build a new club. Hopefully a few new areas are being looked at to start a club there soon!

It's time to look forward as we enter a new decade, 2020, and to "look at the sunny side of everything, and make our optimism come true!" Imagine with me, 110 more members in the SWIS District, that's 2 more per club, holding the best oratorical, essay and CCDHH contests ever, serving 3,850 more kids in new and exciting ways, and getting most of the members in each club engaged in their activities to make that happen. Now that's Optimism!

Because of your generosity, I was recognized as a 4th quarter incentive winner! The incentive program, which was started at the last conference, is just another way we can make a difference in kid's lives.



Oratorical Contest: "Just iMagine a World Without Boundaries"

Imagine helping kids find their own voice! That is just what we as Optimists can do for the youth in our community by holding an Oratorical Competition. As an Oratorical Contestant, Students have an opportunity to win several scholarships by creating and presenting a 4-5 minute speech on the topic: "Just iMagine a World Without Boundaries".

Students practice using many skills in their toolbox and are encouraged to listen to their inner voice- to be aware of their own ideas, and become comfortable discussing them with others. They practice patience, decision-making, memorization, and the ability to ask and accept feedback from their family, friends and other mentors along the way. Being an Oratorical contestant requires time and commitment from the student as well as their family as the student creates their speech, practices and presents their way through the competitions – learning and growing stronger in knowledge and experience on their journey to their personal goals and scholarship opportunities!

By hosting an Oratorical contest in your community, your club provides kids with the opportunity to voice their own views on the topic of "Just iMagine a World Without Boundaries", and share those views with other students and the world around them as they gain confidence, and compete to advance towards winning up to \$22,500 in Scholarships! (District Level Awards: \$2,500, \$1,500 and \$1,000; Regional \$5,000, and World \$15,000, \$10,000 and \$5,000) There is no minimum amount of students allowed to compete at the club level but we would like to reach as many young people as possible-so please take this time to spread the word for this exciting opportunity to all the young people in your community! Place an ad in your local newspaper, share the information on social media, post flyers in grocery stores, financial institutions, libraries, restaurants, student groups, religious institutions and remember your co-workers, neighbors, family and friends!

Remember to approach your local school board and let them know that our Optimist Oratorical Scholarship Program is recommended by both the National Association of Secondary School Principals and the American Association of School Administrators. This endorsement can go a long way when your Club is requesting that principals and teachers offer this program to their students.

*The 1st & 2nd Place Club Winners are usually awarded medallions and advance to the Zone Competition
*The 1st & 2nd Place Winners from the Zone Competition are usually awarded plaques and advance to the SWIS District Competition. The Winning Students are sponsored by their clubs, or, zones may choose to combine resources to sponsor the students advancing to the District competition. The sponsorship fee is \$225 per student.

The contest is designed for young people to gain experience in public speaking, self-confidence, and provide them with an opportunity to compete for multiple scholarships with a pre-assigned topic.

> Plan Your Club Contest

Getting the Contest Started in Your Community-Reach out to everyone & place flyers in grocery stores, 4H Clubs, libraries, your religious institution, and anywhere where students and their families might see it. Your Club may approach local schools to distribute information and coach interested students in preparation for the Club level contest. The program is recommended by both the National Association of Secondary School Principals and the American Association of School Administrators. This endorsement can go a long way when your Club is requesting that principals and teachers offer this program to their students. Reach out to the Department of Education to get contacts for home-schooled students. Contact local, private, everyone you contacted with a Club Member's name and phone number.

- Advance your Club's 1st & 2nd place winners to compete in your zone's combined contest!





Club Fitness: How Fit is your Club?

Our society has changed over the years: We have over 50% of our children living with one parent, a guardian, a grandparent, or in foster care. We have children either in school or daycare while one or both parents work. With a busy family schedule, it is difficult to add another stop along the way. Therefore, recruiting parents to join an optimist club is not as easy as it once was. Each club must evaluate their club, their school, and their community. It is always a good idea to evaluate your club at least once per year, but I recommend more often than that. We can evaluate our clubs' health and sustainability by asking ourselves questions, and looking for new ways to grow our membership, our projects and our reach.

Membership: How many members are in your club? Clubs with less than 20 members may be at risk. Are club officers repeating? Repeating officers could mean lack of leadership talent and burnout. Does the club recruit on a regular basis? Clubs should always be looking for recruitment opportunities.

Funds: Are the fund raisers effective and efficient? Do we have members to cover the required hours? Are we a working club that raises money and gives it away?

Projects: How many projects does the club do and how many members attend on average? When was the last time a new program was added to the Club's service? Or an existing program updated? Have some projects run their course? Do we delete, modify or modernize?

Community: What are the demographics in our community? What is the culture? How can the Optimist Club begin to be inclusive to the cultures that represent our communities? How do we include the citizens of our community? How can we partner with the schools, other service clubs, churches, or other groups?

We need to think outside of the box. One suggestion is utilizing the Club within a Club concept; creating projects that add value to their membership rather than adding work. If there is a group that loves running (15 or more people), help them start an Optimist club. They can plan a run/walk to raise money for a project in their area. Also, there are successful video conferences and social media clubs across the world. They meet, plan and communicate using video, social media and other means of technology. They plan events, meet at the event one and done and then they celebrate.

Just iMagine a Society of Optimists celebrating their efforts in working with our kids and families in our communities by engaging, retaining members, adding members and keeping club rosters. Now is the time to REFRESH, REFURBISH and REVITALIZE within our clubs.

Two Very Good Reasons John Fons

I want to give each one of you two very good reasons for being who you are as Optimists. Each one of you already has reasons of your own to be helpful, to be public minded and spirited in your efforts as volunteer Friends of Youth. Here are two more.

I recently purchased a two volume biography of the man who is arguably the most famous personage in Wisconsin political history. He is Robert Marion LaFollette, "Fighting Bob" as he came to be known, born June 14, 1855 on a Dane County farm near Primrose, Wisconsin and died June 18, 1925. He is buried in Madison's Forest Hill Cemetery. A champion of common causes and common citizens, his wife and daughter who wrote his biography are buried beside him and his grave has been desecrated.

That's right.

Go to Forest Hill Cemetery to view the final resting place of Wisconsin's beloved native son, the honest country lawyer who served as State Governor and US Senator and Presidential candidate of the Progressive Movement and you will find letters of his name broken off from his grave marker by what appears to be the use of a cold chisel and hammer. That's reason Number One.

Reason Number Two comes from last weeks 1st Quarter SWIS District conference in Fitchburg where eighty or so Optimists gathered to speak and listen about the future of Optimism and encourage one another in doing good for their clubs and their communities.

In the very next room of the hotel where we Optimists met another meeting was being conducted behind closed doors, but those doors were made of glass so if you happened to walk by in the hallway you could see what the other meeting was about.

It was attended by thirty or forty adults who paid very close attention to a speaker as he stood before a large projection screen. So while we as Optimists applauded and laughed together in one room, those people were nearby silently taking notes in deadly earnest.

They were learning about the use and function of spring loaded magazines for hand guns and the application of lethal force in use of firearms.

The Optimist Creed begins, "Promise Yourself to be so strong that nothing can disturb your peace of mind." So be it.

Just be sure your Optimism is working, because the world is giving us two more very good reasons why it must.

We have a tradition at our home this time of year.
