# Guest Speaker: Teri Ellefson, Jacob's SWAG (Support with Awareness and Giving) (<u>www.jacobswag.org</u>)

Teri discussed her family's journey after the unexpected suicide death of her son, Jacob, on June 7, 2012. She described the effect of Jacob's death on her husband, marriage, their daughter, and Jacob's friends. Jacob's SWAG Foundation has donated books about kindness and buddy benches to elementary schools, and has supported multiple high school scholarships. They also developed a free app called *Got Your Back* which connects users to their support system (selected friends and family), support resources (calming activities, mood trackers, safety plans, etc), and emergency numbers. There are even pre-written messages so they can ask for help quickly.

Even those clubs who do not have fundraisers that earn great sums of money should be able to send the Foundation \$365. Just think of what you are getting in return.

The Sun Prairie Optimist Club is excited to plan the SWIS District Tri-Star Basketball Competition for the 2021-22 Optimist year. The SWIS District Tri-Star Basketball event is scheduled for **Saturday, April 30th at Prairie View Middle School in Sun Prairie.** 

**Tri-Star Basketball** is for boys and girls between the ages of 6 and 13. The competition can begin in January through April when Optimist Clubs sponsor local contests. Kids compete against others in their own age and gender group in 3 skills: dribbling, shooting and passing. Clubs determine the awards that are given to the winners of each group. The first place winners of each age group advance to the District contest.

**NOW** is the time to start securing a date and location for this event. Looking for a new project? This would be a perfect project for your club. I will be sending out additional materials this month to Club Presidents. The information you will be receiving will make it possible for you to have a successful event.

The SWIS District has a strong tradition of supporting local clubs who put on local Tri-Star contests. Before COVID, our district-wide basketball competition each spring continued to be the largest gathering of kids at the district level. A number of clubs have increased their success rate by collaborating with other organizations to stage the local contests. These organizations have included YMCA, Boys and Girls Clubs, Recreational and other Basketball programs. Clubs report that with a partnership, expenses go down, attendance goes up and they get staff help to stage their local contests. These organizations have robust membership roles that can be marketed to join in the events. Other clubs tie in with school programs. No matter which way you go, there is a lot of help out there to host an excellent local event. You can then sit back and watch your kid's excitement as they win trips to the district competition! I promise your kids will enjoy their trip to the district competition. As our 50th Anniversary year comes to a close, I wanted to share a few significant Foundation achievements from this past year with you. <u>Watch the video of accomplishments</u>.

1. We supported, to the full extent, all of the Optimist International programs that we normally do. In fact, we increased and expanded our support:

- We increased the Matching Club Grant amount from \$500 up to \$1000. This action made all of our grants, Childhood Health and Wellness, Disaster Relief and New Club Projects, at the up to \$1000 level.
- We established a Past International JOI President Scholarship fund. While scholarships to Past International JOI Presidents have been awarded in the past, there was inconsistency from year to year. This fund will ensure that the scholarship will be awarded on a consistent basis.
- With our first contribution to the Optimist Junior Golf Program, the OIF can now proudly state that we support all of the youth programs of Optimist International.
- 2. We increased communication with our fellow members:
  - We published a quarterly newsletter that was distributed to Club, District and International leaders.
  - We expanded our training opportunities; Provided Learning Management Training for our Foundation Club and District Representatives and webinar training for OIF leaders as well as Optimist members.
  - Video snippets on various topics were produced and shared through publications and on social media. These videos expanded our reach to inform our members and the public about the support the Foundation provides.

3. We increased the donations this year by close to 30%. This will enable us to continue to support all of the programs of Optimist International and provide the grants and scholarships for our Optimist Clubs and Districts. 




