Now, the schools have a few weeks of learning how to use the dictionary! The Brodhead Optimist Club has been doing this project for many years and it is great to see the reaction of the students.

For the City Christmas Fire & Ice Festival, Optimists baked over 500 cutout cookies, decorated them, bagged two cookies each, and handed them out to children 12 years and under. The count was 280 bags received. We've done this for several years. The program has been adjusted slightly due to the pandemic. Hopefully, kids will be able to decorate a couple of cookies to take with them in years to come!

On December 14, The Brodhead Optimist Club presented two \$2,000 checks for childhood cancer. One check was for UW-Wisconsin American Children's Hospital and the second check was presented to Badger Childhood Cancer Network, Madison WI. The \$4,000 was fundraised during our annual Pig Roast held in July at the Veterans City Park.

The Broadhead Optimist Club sponsored a Mitten Tree Project for Brodhead Children who need Christmas presents. There were 92 presents purchased and wrapped bought by the generous citizens of Brodhead. On December 18th, we parents of families in need picked up these presents. We hope all have a very Merry Christmas.



Competition Timeline:

Club: Should be held in March or, at the very latest, the first week in April. 1st & 2nd place winners will advance to the Zone competition. The 3rd place winner will advance if either the 1st or 2nd place winner is unable to attend. All contestants should receive a club participation certificate, and the 1st, 2nd and 3rd place winners should be awarded with <u>Optimist International Oratorical medals</u>.

Zone: Lt Governors will plan the dates, times, and locations for Zone competitions. These will be held in the 2nd or 3rd week of April. The 1st & 2nd place Zone winners will advance to compete at the SWIS District Scholarship Level Contest.

SWIS District: Will be held during our 3rd Quarter District Conference on May14th. Scholarships will be awarded to 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place (\$2,500, \$1,500, \$1,000) winners. All students will be awarded a District Competition participation certificate. The 1st place winner will advance to the regional competition for the Great Plains in St. Louis.

Regional & World: Will take place July 20-22, 2022 in St. Louis. The 1st place scholarship winner of the Great Plains Region (\$5,000) advances to the World Championship competition that same weekend. 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place (\$15,000, \$10,000, \$5,000) winners will be awarded scholarships.


