The Essay Contest is sponsored by Optimist International to give young people the opportunity to write about their own opinions regarding the world in which they live.



SWIS District Essay Contest

Another Optimist year has begun and together we continue to help kids in our communities through service and opportunities such as the essay contest. The essay topic for the 2022-2023 year is: Who is an Everyday Hero that Brings Out the Optimism in You?

The competition is open to contestants under the age of 19 as of 10/1/22 and who have not yet completed secondary school or its equivalent. There is no minimum age. Essays must be 700-800 words in length. Publicize the competition at your local high schools and student groups. Interested students should submit their essay on the assigned topic to your club. Each club determines their own deadline for submission of entries, but a deadline between January 1 and February 1 is recommended to allow time for your judges to give every essay a fair reading.

Each club's 1st place essay must be mailed to me no later than midnight, February 28, 2023. If necessary, they can also be scanned and emailed to me. The winner of the District essay will receive a plaque and a \$2,500 scholarship, and will join the oratorical winners at the Kalahari Resort for the 3rd quarter conference in May.

Students must be under the age of 19 as 10/1/22. Clubs should hold their competitions in February/March 2023 and award 1st, 2nd and 3rd place winners with medallions. Club's 1st and 2nd place winners will advance to compete at the Zone contest, hosted by the Lt. Governors in early to mid-April 2023.

The Zone Contest 1st and 2nd place winners are typically awarded with a plaque and advance to the District Oratorical Scholarship contest which will be held May 5th and 6th in the Wisconsin Dells at the Kalahari resort & waterpark during our 3rd quarter District Optimist conference & celebration. The District 1st place Winner receives a \$2,500 scholarship, the District 2nd place Winner receives a \$1,500 scholarship and the District 3rd place Winner receives a \$1,000 scholarship.

In addition, our District 1st place Winner advances to compete in St. Louis July 20-22 2023 to compete for in the Great Plains Regional contest for a chance to win a \$5,000 scholarship. Should our student representing the SWIS District win at the Great Plains Regional contest, our student would compete at the final level in the World Championship Scholarship contest on July 22, 2023 for a chance to win scholarships in the amount of \$15,000 for 1st place, \$10,000 for 2nd place and \$5,000 for 3rd place

SWIS District Junior Optimist International (JOI)

The SWIS District would like to announce a new award for the 2022-2023 Optimist International: Junior Optimist International (JOI) Club of the Year! The awards have been privately donated with first place \$400 and the runner up \$100, they will be judged and given points based on five criteria.

- 1. Help with Projects of your Sponsoring Club: 30 Points Max
- 2. Member Development Programs and Optimistic Activities: **40 Points Max** Attach a list of Youth Activities and Contests such as: Optimist Day, Optimist in Action, Optimist Photography, Spark in the Park, Visual Arts, Musical Happiness, Oratorical and Essay contest, etc.
- 3. Club Growth and Increased Awareness Campaigns: **10 Points Max** Promotions throughout your school and new members etc.
- 4. Increased School Project Base: help your school with something! 10 Points Max
- 5. New Community Efforts: help in your community specifically. 10 Points Max

All Clubs wishing to participate should submit/email a letter addressing each of the 5 criteria points, by May 31st. Currently we have eight JOI Clubs in the District and we are looking to start more. We encourage your club to get involved and start a JOI club in 2022-23. **New JOI clubs as well as established Clubs, as well as clubs with large or small memberships will have an equal opportunity to receive Club of the Year. The Sun Prairie Optimist club is excited to host the SWIS District Tri-Star Basketball competition for the 2022-23 Optimist year. The SWIS District Tri-Star Basketball event is scheduled for Saturday, April 29th at Prairie View Middle School in Sun Prairie.

Tri-Star Basketball is for boys and girls between the ages of 6 and 13. Club competitions can take place between January and April. Kids compete against others in their own age and gender group in three skills: dribbling, shooting, and passing. Clubs determine the awards that are given to the winners of each group. The first place winners of each age group advance to the District contest.

NOW is the time to start securing a date and location for this event. Looking for a new project? This would be a perfect project for your club. If you have not received additional materials on how to have a successful event reach out to me at and I will send the materials out. The information you will be receiving will make it possible for you to have a successful event.

The SWIS District has a robust tradition of supporting local clubs who put on local Tri-Star contests. Our districtwide basketball competition each spring is the largest gathering of kids at the district level. A number of clubs have increased their success rate by collaborating with other organizations to stage the local contests. These organizations have included YMCA, Boys and Girls Clubs, Recreational and other Basketball programs. Clubs report that with a partnership, expenses go down, attendance goes up and they get staff help to stage their local contests. These organizations have robust membership roles that can be marketed to join in the events. Other clubs tie in with school programs. No matter which way you go, there is a lot of help out there to host an excellent local event. You can then sit back and watch your kid's excitement as they win trips to the district competition! I promise your kids will enjoy their trip to the district competition. Again, If I can ever be of service or answer questions for you, feel free to reach out to me.

Governor Jo'El's theme is "All Roads Lead to Optimism." We are all going to have roads that will challenge us. There will be roadblocks when planning your event. 
